If you are interested in planting trees, please use this link to request a grant. Please be sure to include the number and cost of trees in your application.

Note, if you are a municipality, please use invitation code 67996C3KFE when applying. According to the National Forest Foundation and Nitrofill.com:

- 1.9 billion trees are planted each year.
- In one year, 100 mature trees can remove 53 tons of carbon dioxide and 430 pounds of pollution from the atmosphere.
- An average-sized tree produces enough oxygen in one year to keep a family of four breathing.
- Three trees planted in the right place around a building can cut air-conditioning costs up to 50%
- Trees make people feel good. Workers are more productive when they see trees along their commute route and from their office windows. It also helps hospital patients heal faster with fewer medications


